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

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WESTDALE - BUILDING COMMUNITY

The theme for this year is Building Community. We live in a wonderful neighborhood in Los Angeles and a big part of what makes that special is our neighbors. The challenge this year is to actively work to expand our community. Whether you are participating in our schools, neighborhood councils, park programs,



Neighborhood Watch, Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) or volunteer organizations please look for ways to involve more of the Westdale Community. To sustain the features we love in Westdale will require building a larger community of participants.

The Westdale Homeowners Association Annual Meeting was held on January 26th. It was an active year for the Westdale Homeowners Association. The 2015 Block Party was held on Coolidge Ave and attracted close to 500 people including Council Member Bonin and LAPD Senior Lead Office Acosta. Marjorie Templeton is our new Village editor. The Mar Vista Community Council Fall Festival and Silent Auction was a success with a wine basket donation from Westdale. We also donated to the Police Department Toys for Tots drive.

The Annual Meeting featured Len Nguyen who is a Field Deputy for Mike Bonin and Council District 11. He has been working in the Council District 11 for ten years. Len introduced Phyllis Hayashibara, Chair of the Venice Japanese American Memorial Marker (VJAMM) Committee. The marker will be installed at the northwest corner of Venice Blvd and Lincoln Blvd and will honor local Japanese Americans that were interned during World War II. Len talked about the development of the VA property for housing homeless Veterans that is being planned for the near future. He also touched on the issue of jets flying lower over Mar Vista.

The 11th District Council Office was also represented by Ezra Gale, Senior Planner. Ezra talked about a variety of development projects that will be



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impacting our Westdale neighborhood. These include:

- 1) Small lot subdivisions on the Barrington corridor that may include a total of 14 single family homes that are presently zoned R3. The owners are being actively pursued by developers.
- 2) Traffic on Barrington and cut through traffic through our neighborhood.
- 3) Development of the Martin Cadillac property on the corner of Bundy and Olympic. They are planning 500 residential units plus retail shops.

We also heard from our LAPD Senior Lead Officer Adrian Acosta. He emphasized the fact that we live in a safe community because we are vigilant. Our Neighborhood Watch program is a critical component of our safety. Our board member Leah Oye was recognized for her outstanding efforts in the Neighborhood Watch program. Officer Acosta encouraged residents to contact him (cell phone at (310) 622–3973 or e-mail at 37285@LAPD.LAcity.org). He emphasized that if we suspect a criminal activity is occurring be sure to first contact 911. Read more about this in his article on page 3.

The meeting concluded with presentations by Mar Vista Community Council President Bill Koontz, our CERT Coordinator Carl Ginsberg, and a Real Estate report by Debbie Kaplan. Please note that Mar Vista Community Council Elections are in June and they are looking for candidates.

In closing, please look for ways to Build Community. Your participation and encouragement to others to participate is essential to keeping Westdale wonderful.

Good day all. I hope that this note finds you well.

After twelve consecutive years of crime reduction, the City of Los Angeles saw an increase in overall crime by nearly 15%. Pacific Division was not immune to the increase with an 11% increase. That increase was fueled by property crimes: Grand Theft Auto, Burglary, Theft, and Theft from Motor Vehicle.

Although some of these crimes were situations where the suspect forced entry, a majority, nearly 70%, were due to an open point of entry: unlocked door, window, gate or unattended property. These are all crimes of opportunity, and it is up to us to eliminate the opportunity. So far this year you are doing just that. In the first few months of calendar year 2016, we are seeing a decrease in crime to the tune of nearly 20% in the Mar Vista Area. KEEP IT UP!!





REAL ESTATE REPORT IS A SHIFT COMING?


I've lived in the Westdale/Trousdale neighborhood for the last 11 years and we've watched the market go down and up. We actually bought at close to the top of the market, remodeled and then watched the market go way down and now back up. The market fluctuation is normal and real estate goes through cycles.

The Westside real estate market is what we consider blue chip real estate. It's a pretty safe investment over time and always goes up, however just like the stock market it can also go down. Historically if one doesn't need to sell in the down cycle, the market goes back up and it's always higher than the last peak. We may be nearing the top or we may have a bit more time to reach it. Generally during an election year and other times of uncertainty people tend to do nothing or take a wait and see attitude. The uncertainty can start a shift in the marketplace.

When the shift in the market happens weather it's a rise or a decline it happens slowly over time, so the market goes up slowly and goes down slowly. The following numbers that relate to Westdale/Trousdale for the past three years are a perfect illustration of that point.



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
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PLANE TRAFFIC OVER MAR VISTA

There has been discussion lately about the increase in airplane traffic over our community. My pilot son, Chris, showed me an interesting app, Flightradar24, that gives live information about planes in the area along with their origin and destination, plane type, and altitude. It is clear to me, after viewing the airspace, that it is a waste of time to try to get the FAA to change anything!

We live near one of the world's busiest airports. If the planes don't come over our homes, they will be going over another area. I counted 29 commercial planes, including 3 from London, over our house between 7PM and 9PM one evening. Here is a graphic picture of the planes in our area at 9AM on February 1st:



Notice the circle on the left side. This represents our house and the Santa Monica airport. The planes from the West Coast, Hawaii, Asia, and Australia go right over our house. I suspect that a recent change has also brought many of the European planes over our house as well. At the time that I took this picture, the planes over us included 1 from Japan, 3 from N. California, 1 from Hong Kong, and 1 from Canada. In addition, we have planes crossing to and from other airports. To add to the mix, we have the planes in and out of Santa Monica.





Here is the flight path of a plane from Tokyo. I think that the planes use our house as a beacon! The big 777s and Airbuses are at least 7,000' when they pass over Mar Vista. Some of the 737s are lower. The noisiest are the propeller planes into Santa Monica.

Some of the complaints are due to a temporary change due to military tests which caused night flights over the city. Normally, all flights in and out of LAX between midnight and 6:00 AM are over the ocean. I have not heard it officially, but I think that there is also rerouting of planes from Europe. We fly to Sweden every year to visit our son Edward and his family. Until this year, we flew over San Bernadino and across the LA basin. This June, we flew down the central valley, across Malibu, and then right over our house. We have planes flying over us from London, Zurich, Frankfurt, and Copenhagen. This lessens the impact on the residents of eastern LA, but it increases traffic for us in Mar Vista. As a frequent flyer, I believe that it is important to set the flight paths in the safest and most efficient way. My message is to accept this change and put our efforts into what we can possibly influence!

PARK REPORT

Mar Vista Park continues to be a very fun and active resource. The Winter Sports programs continue to grow. The Winter sports programs include basketball, soccer and hockey. Also remember that the park offers open activities like table tennis, badminton, and volleyball. The Mar Vista Park brochure can be found at www.laparks.org/dos/reccenter/pdf/marVista/brochure.pdf.

As I mentioned in the Winter Villager, the proceeds from the Fall Festival are being bundled with other donations to install acoustic tiles in the gymnasium to help deaden the noise in that facility. We have a park-approved vendor, The Sound Control Company, that has provided quotes. The Park Advisory Board is reviewing proposals. We have enough money in the Festival and Los Angeles Park's Foundation fund to do this project. The park will be looking at dates that minimize the impact on the basketball programs to begin installation.

The replacement of the synthetic surface on the soccer field is moving forward. The funds have been identified, and the city is gathering bids and should have chosen a vendor by March. We anticipate replacement to begin in early summer with the field unavailable for 6-8 weeks.
